

#### Métis National Council's Definition of Métis

Métis means a person who:

- \infty self-identifies as Métis
- is distinct from otherAboriginal people
- is of historic Métis Nation ancestry
- and who is accepted by the Métis Nation

## How many uses of a sash can you come up with?



Sash

### Below are some of the documented uses of the sash:

- A Belt (for a coat)
- Holding items, such as a hunting knife, or a fire bag
- Symbol of pride and affiliation
- Decoration
- Tourniquet for injuries
- Fringes were knotted to count the days
- Tumpline (a strap that passes over the forehead to carry a load on the back)

- A Rope
- A Scarf
- Key Holder
- First Aid Kit
- Washcloth
- Towel
- Emergency Bridle/Saddle Blanket
- Sewing Kit
- Ankle cover (to prevent snow from getting in leggings when walking in deep snow)
- Markers left on buffalo (after killed- to mark buffalo as their property)

#### Elzéar Goulet Sash

Elzéar Goulet wore this re-design of the original Assomption sash. In 1869, Elzéar Goulet served as second-in-command of the Métis militia under Ambroise-Dydime Lépine during the Resistance



#### L'Assomption Sash


This sash originates from L'Assomption, Québec, dating back to about the 18th century. It is the oldest known sash design. L'Assomption sashes were the most common sashes in western Canada until around 1850.





#### The Dark Times Sash

This sash design was created around 1885, during the time of the Battle of Batoche. The black border replaces the red in order to represent the times of diaspora and resistance. This period started around 1870 – 1885 when the Métis were considered "traitors" and had to hide their identity for over a hundred years.

## The Sash

- is a cultural symbol of Métis Identity
- may be worn at special events, such as weddings, festivals, graduations
- may be given as a special gift

### Fun Facts

- A sash could take up to 200 hours to create. At minimum wage that sash would cost over \$2800!
- Some sashes were woven so tightly with waxed threads they could carry water for short distances




